HISTORICAL	Professor Sir David Orme Masson was educated at Edinburgh University, obtaining a Master of Arts in 1878, a Bachelor of Science in 1880, and gained a Doctorate of Science in 1884. He held a lectureship for one year under Prof. William Ramsay at University College, Bristol and was Resident Fellow at Edinburgh from 1884 to 1886. In the same year Masson was appointed Prof. of Chemistry at the University of Melbourne, a position he held until his retirement in 1923. Masson made a significant contribution to the advancement of science in Australia, and he took a leading part in the foundation of the Advisory Council of Science and Industry (later the CSIRO). As well, at various times throughout his career, he presided over a number of national scientific and research organizations.
