HISTORICAL NOTE: Professor Osborne was born on 6 August 1873 in Northern Ireland, and educated at Queen's College Belfast, University College London, and Tubingen. After working as Assistant Professor of Physiology at University College, London, he took up the Chair of Physiology at Melbourne in 1904, where he remained until his retirement in 1938. He was also Dean of the Faculty of Medicine from 1929. His wife Ethel (neé Goodson) whom he married in 1903, graduated in Sciences in England and in Medicine in Australia. They had four children. Osborne died on 28 August 1967 at Greensborough, Victoria.

PRELIMINARY LIST OF RECORDS:

The Collection is divided into five groups:

- GROUP 1. Consists of personal diaries 1911 and 1912, 1917, 1919, 1922-23, 1929, 1937, 1959-65

Although the entries are, as described by himself "brief and factual" they show the manifold interests as well as the close family ties which are so well documented in Professor Osborne's writings and family correspondence. They also reveal the continuing contact with overseas friends and associates.

- GROUP 2. (5 boxes) contains mostly family letters, the largest number from his mother with whom he stayed in weekly correspondence until her death in 1928. These and the rest of the family correspondence, including a large number of early sketches and drawings of 5-9 year old children bear witness to the close family ties which extend to letters received from his grand-daughter in the middle 60s.
- The group also includes the letters from D.J. Medley and notably those from Geoffrey Kaye which again point to the variety of Prof. Osborne's interests as well as his intellectual strength even as an octogenarian.

- GROUP 3. (8 boxes) Documentation of educational and professional career. Family and property papers, a small collection of books, mostly his own writings, Rotary Club (of which he was an original member) as well as Wallaby Club papers. There are some mementos from his extensive travels and other personal papers.

- GROUP 4. Almost 200 broadcasts in the series "What shall we have for dinner?" in conjunction with Elizabeth Howell, the Radio talks on food for O'Brien Publicity Pty Ltd on food and nutrition, as well as a collection of writings (4/3-4/8) again testifying to the variety of scientific, literary and artistic accomplishments, including contributions to medical journals, a play and a novella.

- GROUP 5. A small collection of Stone Age fragments of pottery from Arizona, U.S.A.

 Entries on Rotary affairs are prominent throughout the year, both regarding functions in Melbourne and during the USA-Europe trip later in the year. Many entries refer to the activities on the property in Warrandyte, where Professor Osborne is actively engaged, hence also the numerous references to the weather. Until his departure on 8th May, entries are mainly concerned with private, social and family matters with University activities less often mentioned. 8.5.1922 to Sydney - Samoa - San Francisco - Los Angeles - (by train) to M? - Y? - Grand Canyon - Arizona - New Mexico - Rio Grande - Santa Fe - Colorado - Kansas - Ohio - New York (17/7-21/7) (with a lengthy observation on New York hotels) - Liverpool - the ? trip to Leeds - London - Ireland - Leeds - Oxford - London - Belfast - there the diary ends.

1929

From 24th July the diary records a trip to America and Europe. The entries are much more professionally related than the diary notes of previous overseas trips. They also record a far greater number of medical contacts and hospitals/schools as well as meetings with Rotarians, who took care of Professor Osborne on his US and Mexican trip.

The diary before July is far more University related than former entries, although private, family and Warrandyte affairs are still prominent. Frequent mention is made of Rotary, the Food Standard Committee and on occasion the Forest League.

Mrs (Ethel) Osborne, absent at the beginning of the year returned to Melbourne on 31st March. There are also many entries prior to Audrey's wedding (12.7.1919) relative to the event.
