HISTORICAL NOTE	Miss Langham was born in 1902 and trained as a General Nurse at the Royal Melbourne Hospital, graduating in 1932. Training as a midwife followed, before she commenced a distinguished career, first as Ward Sister then Night Superintendent at the Royal Melbourne; with the Australian Inland Mission in the Northern Territory; and from Feb. 1940 in the Australian Army, where she reached the rank of Captain and served in England, the Middle East and New Guinea. On return to Australia she served as Matron of the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital, and after demobilisation, as Matron of the Warrnambool and Ballarat Base Hospitals She was awarded an OBE in 1969, and died in 1988.

### **HISTORICAL NOTE:**

Miss Jessie Margaret Langham was born in 1902 in Gippsland and educated at the Presbyterian Ladies College, Melbourne. She trained as a General Nurse at the Royal Melbourne Hospital graduating in 1932. After twelve months as a staff nurse during which she was awarded the hospital Gold Medal she joined the Royal Women's Hospital to complete her midwifery training. Returning to the Royal Melbourne she served as a Ward Sister and after five years became Night Superintendent. Following this she spent two years with the Australian Inland Mission at Victoria River Downs, Northern Territory. In February 1940 she enlisted in the Australian Army Nursing Service 2/3 Australian General Hospital (AGH) and later the 2/11 AGH. War service in England commenced on the Salisbury Plain, then on to the Middle East to an Australian Hospital on the Suez Canal and Alexandria. On her return to Australia, Miss Langham was appointed Senior Sister at the 2/3 Casualty Clearing Station in the Tablelands of Queensland and New Guinea. For her military service she was awarded the Associate of the Royal Red Cross (ARRC) in 1945. Returning to Australia she was appointed Deputy Matron at the Heidelberg Repatriation Hospital.

On discharge from the Forces in 1946, Miss Langham was appointed Matron of the Warrnambool Hospital, and in December 1947 was appointed Matron of the Ballarat and District Base Hospital where she served until her retirement in September 1967. She was made a Fellow of the College of Nursing, Australia in 1950. In the 1969 Queen's Birthday Honours she was awarded the Order of British Empire (OBE) for services to Nursing.

On 4 August 1988 the Board of Management of the Ballarat Base Hospital renamed the former Nurses Home 'Jessie Langham House' in her honour. Miss Langham died on 12 November 1988. [Biography from Ballarat Base Hospital Memorial, Item 2/6 below.]
