The Classical Association of Victoria was founded on 23 October 1912, nine years after the establishment of The Classical Association in Britain (December 1903), with which was was affiliated. Said to have been founded under the inspiration of Dr. Alex. Leeper, who became its President and remained so until November 1932, its objects were to promote and maintain classical studies by various means. Its news-sheet IRIS notified members of meetings and reported addresses given by member and guest speakers. H.E. ("Barney") Allen (1875-1949), a student of Professor T.G. Tucker, was Resident Tutor in Classics in Ormond College from 1897, Senior Tutor in 1907 and Vice-Master from 1915 to 1943, when he retired. After two years with the A.I.F. during World War I he joined the A.I.F. Education Service as the representative of the University. He was a president of the National Ice Skating Association of Australia and of the Victorian Fly-Fishers' Association, and a member of the Ormond College Council. He was the first Hon. Secretary of the Association and editor of its Newssheet, IRIS, and from 1932 its President. Beatrice М. Little (a teacher at Toorak College from where she retired in 1936), who had served for a number of years as Honorary Secretary, took over the editorship of the news-sheet in ?. The Association met in the Cathedral Chapter House, Assembly Hall, Lyceum Club, Returned Army Nurses' Club, Anzac House etc.

H.W. Allen. Inaugural memorial lecture [look up date and speaker]

H.W. ALLEN

Letters 1919 (one undated), 1928-1948 to Beatrice Little. One envelope. The earliest of these are written from England while Allen was waiting to return to Australia after war service. The latter group are chiefly concerned with arranging the contents of IRIS and addresses to Association meetings.

H.W. Allen to Marcus Wells

Letters 1917-1949 H.W. Allen to Marcus Wells. Presented to the Classical Association [in black spring-back folder with other items, now in fresh cover] Letters are numbered.

"Letter 1 1918". From Halton Camp East, Bucks., 31 March 1918. Fears for friends and his brother; no prospect of Allen getting there and his work as a clerk; reading his first book by Henry James. Typed, torn at fold. Notes by Wells giving history of their correspondence from early 1918 until shortly before Allen's death.

Letters 2 & 3 1918. From Education Office, AIF Corps. H.W. France, 25 September 1918. In France at last for a month or two with the chief aim to get to know conditions and possibilities there and meet the Digger in his proper element has learned what devastation means. Wells' application has not come to them but hopes he will be able to help in spreading the gospel; the first training school which will start in England early October; friends and books; a "Cook's tourist". Attached: Wells' notes 2 ms. quoting from Allen's next letter, 4 April 1918; and commenting on the third war letter [i.e. the above no second letter here].

4. 11 March 1920. Wells' operation; he told Aeneas the truth in saying Allen was in danger of becoming a black misanthrope; pleasure in being introduced to Bozzy, and fishing; Allen's idea of life, nine months in town and three in the wilds; "Foe Farrell" by "Q". Note by Wells, identifying Aeneas of these letters as the Rev. A. Macdonald, M.A.

5. 21 March 1920. Wells' hobby of working full-oak and Allen's own handwork (including knitting); Allen "a devout pious hater(?) of America". [Attached]

6. 6 June 1920 Decision not to Sydney partly because of the extravagance of going for a week's skating, partly because he had rahly promised that if the Prince ofWales wanted to see boomerangs thrown, he would show him. Profoundly sorryfor the nervous tiredness of the Prince. Visits to the Booklovers and books; his period in London has shown him just where we stand in regard to civilisation here.

7. 1 Aug. 1920. Imminent trip to Sydney fo the skating, staying with sister; his liking for variety in pursuits; other men's work e.g. stonemason's; no music or literature part from the Beethoven Festival; "The Road to En-Dor", Renan etc.; glad Wells has brought Andrew to his bearings - the rudest and maddest as well as the cleverest man in Melbourne - Perhaps we shall have the pluck to kick Mannix out, now England has given a lead [paragraph blue pencilled].

8. 27 Aug. 1922. Hopes the long spell of knee trouble is ending and can wlk again; Wells' "Sunday Comments" the right medium which he tnks are too good to be buried in the St. Arnaud Times and suggests Wells' offering to city editors - The Forum (editor Miss Masson), The New Outlook, Sydney, or Saturday Age or Argus and comments on thsm; Fowler's play and "The Beggar's Opera". Bennett's Mr. Prohack?" and cost of books.

"Letter 10 9?" Sheet separated from letter, but presumably 4 Jan. 1923. Congratulates Wells on his first walk after a long time; recommends a translation of the Republic; Butler's Notebooks <u>are</u> available, and Mullens are always hopeless [passage blue-pencilled]; trout-fishing.

"Letter 9 10?" 16 April 1923. Is a lover of good wood and regrets that bull-oak is being burnt as firewood; has a special slab of teatree from Khancoban for the arms of aland-net, and other pieces and would welcome bull-oak; if Wells cherish's "pure andperfect hatredf of Americanism" read "Babgbitt" by sinclair Lewis; other books [note by Beatrice Little in margin]

11. 23 April 1923. A beautiful knifeof Wells' workmanship; asks for a walk-stick; value for Austrlian timbers and a Sydneyu friend making "period" furniture of australian woods, designed by his architect and artist brother, a man after Wells' heart; regrets Wells' hatred of America not as pure and perfect as his own [quotes pet hates]; C.E. Montague autor.

12. 12 June 1923. The stick a beauty; Wells' health and the price paid for out upright stance; skating and a trip to Switzerlan; the War Book delayed. 2 ms. Attached: notes by Wells.

13. 26 Aug. 1923. Agrees with Wells' philosophy of life; cost of pleasures; "Babbitt" and James Branch Cabell; Wells' health and hobby, and his own - bead-work etc.; woods

14. 7 Nov. 1923. The Booklovers' Library, the University Press "cheaper, and better informed, and quicker, than anybody else" and books recommended; the "wild man" and civilisation and skating; his pessimism at the end of the year, etc.

15. 19 May 1924. Regrets that Wells is on crutches; "Figures of the Earth", "The Forsyte Saga" and other books; his enjoyment of his trip - St. Moritz and Manchester for skating, "The Birds" at Cambridge (which he had once played at Ormond College; "Hassan", "Ruddigore" etc.; Wells' wood-carving and patterns.

16. 26 April 1926 On Aristophanes, "The Cantab" (Shane Leslie), and plagiarism of his own writing on skating.

17. 26 August 1926. Books and our lack of the notion of grandeur, wildflowers reminding him of Royal Park; a fine coathanger. Attached: Wells' notes.

18. 14 December 1926. Re Wells helping in the shearing =-shed and secretaryship of "everythng in the neighbouhood" and Presidency of the Cricket Association. Allen's own cricket troubles, unpacking classical books for the library, and reading the new Kipling stories - none worthwhle- and Wells. Homer and Herodotus will take on fising rip. Wells' notes attached.

19. 22 Dec. 1927. Holiday plans and return to receive Library furniture; "Donald Times' photograph of Wells; cricket; Books.

20.8 May 1928. Classical reference to ram's tongues; origin of "quarter"; Trollope, Wells, Bennett, Hardy, Rabelais, Eric Glen. Attached: Well's notes.

21. 19 Nov. 1928. [some blue pencilling] Meeting of the Conway quarantors; Well's grazing farm; the Vera Historia and "Xen."; a new jape for the Symposium; cricket; books.

22. 19 Mar. 1929. [some blue pencilling] Books; extra work for the absent professor.

23. 10 Dec. 91929 ["Wells" blue pencilled] Greg's second attack.

24. 8 June 1930 " "Has completely dropped all the concerns of the Classical Association because he is carrying "the baby of the College" for the next 12 months. Master ordered away for a long trip. Books (Priestley's Good Companions", "ALl Quiet" etc.) 25. 5 May 1931 Greg's hopeless illness. Attached: Well's notes.

26. 6 Sept.1933. Thanks for spring flowers; preparations for departure. Attached: notes by Wells.

27. 16 Oct. 1934. Beautiful sticks arrived and given to Masefield and Mrs. Masefield. Attached: nots by Wells.

28. 9 JAn. 1935, from Khancoban, Waterfall Farm. Fishng; Well's grasshoppers; Atached: note by WElls/

29. 29 Sept. 1935. Wells' gift of wood, being used to hold with "the gadget for holding a desk-pen". Attched: note by Wells.

30. 13 Feb. 1939. [some blue pencilling]Bush-fires; civilising the Rotarians. Attached: Note by Wells.

31. 3 Feb. 1946, from Frankston. Allen unaware that Tucker had contributed to the Argue under a nom de plume but knows that he was nt "Quintilian" and other comments on Tucker.Knows nothing of [Piesse? passage blue pencilled]; his garden. Attached: notes by Wells.

32. 6 Jan. 1947. Fishing camp (bound to go because Hon. Sec. of the Club)but no longer fishes. His laziness, and visit to Khancoban to be with some oldest an best friends. Sadness of losing friends and death of Aeneas [Macdonald?]; Wells' son Ken in Japan; cricket.

33. 26 Oct. 1947from Frankston. Cardus' book and cricket and cricketers [a passage blue-pencilled]; the atomic bomb.

34. 4 Nov. 1947. Cardus' book; ZMoiseiwitch's visit to Sir Ernest Scott and Lady Scott (formerly the well-known pianist Emily Dyason) and her bet to hi that he couldn't play the arabesque by her former teacher Arensky a his next concert aftr 20 minutes perusal (he did, from memory); his dislike of dogs; cricket; gardening [close blue-pencilled].

35. 12 Jan. 1949. Trip to Khancoban to hand over to a successor the secretarysip and management he has held for 20 odd years. Can no longer fish that river, and without fishing it is useless to go thre. His portrait in fising garb by Julian Smith hung with ceremony in the dining room [blue pencilled passage].Sadness at loss of friends. Attached: note by Wells.

"The last letter" Frankston, 6 July 1949 [Wells and Lawrence's names blue-pencilled] Cannot recall Lawrence - probbly a student when Allen wa a University lecturer, "sitting on a high platform and having no real contact with my class - a state of things I didnot at all like, and very different from prsonal College tuition, to which I soon returned". Agrees, they did meet some queer fish in the ranks but all amalgamated into good companions; the "awful job" of coal mining; his own renewal of ill-health. Attached: Notes by Wells.

"Last words": note by Wells closing "The End".

H.W. Allen to Charles Low

25 Jun 1934 (to Low at the Malvern Grammar School). Has looked a Low's verses and make suggestions.

13 June 1938 (to Low at Clare College, Cambridge).
