how long. Please wear the  
blue linen dress yourself  
if you have any use for it.  
don't keep it till I go to  
Australia because I can  
get one in Hong Kong -

Mrs Tisdale asked me to  
Bridge one day with Mrs  
Posar & Mrs Davis. also I  
have joined the Bridge Club.  
There are 8 of us & each one  
takes it in turn to have the  
other seven in her house.  
my turn is not for some  
time - when it is I will  
have the two card tables  
at opposite ends of the

drawing room & have the  
tea on the dining room  
table so every thing will  
be quite compact. At first  
I used to feel anxious about  
things going right but now  
I have such a good boy that  
there is no more trouble.  
I got a new card table at  
auction for £10 6. 0<sup>0</sup> a very  
nice one. we needed to have  
two. The mosquito net I got  
from Young Tidwell - I thought  
it best, because it is a new  
good one with no unexpected  
holes. I have been so busy  
but now everything is quiet

ready for the summer -  
I am getting the casperio  
put away & my white  
dresses made larger -

Thanks I received the French  
vests. After all I am not  
taking lessons. my time  
seems all taken up. but  
still I am glad to have the  
book. You asked what I do  
with the electric iron. Well  
I have pressed Leif's suits  
once or twice & my evening  
dresses & I use it for  
muffles & small things  
like that. I bought a nice  
little strong table at auction

for £1.1 & I keep that in  
the hall outside the bathroom  
it just fits in behind the  
red curtains & is just the  
thing for ironing on.  
Yes I have heard of the  
wonderful changes in  
Western Australia - very  
likely it is true too.

We are asked to the Bevans  
tomorrow evening. I don't  
know what they are going  
to do but Leif has been asked  
to take his mandoline.

On the 14<sup>th</sup> we went to dinner  
at the Tolpssen's. They have

such a lovely house in  
Singa Road with a big  
garden. The 17<sup>th</sup> is the  
day they <sup>Norwegians</sup> celebrate the  
disunion of Norway  
from Sweden. There  
were between 30 & 40

Norwegians there - the  
dining room was  
arranged with 6 small  
tables & decorated with  
Norwegian flags. On the  
20<sup>th</sup> Madame ~~Tan~~ gave a  
dinner party. Mr & Mrs  
Jansen were there, the  
Norwegian consul &

two other men - afterwards  
we played Bridge & had a  
very nice evening. Leif's  
friend from Chinkieng-  
Pasmussen stayed two  
or three days with us. One  
night he brought a Mr  
Olson home to dinner &  
another night a boy called  
Loausen - both nights we  
played Bridge so we have  
had quite late nights last  
week & are glad of a change  
though I was very pleased  
to have Pasmussen here &  
so was Leif. When he went

home he was very good & sent us a lovely piece of Chinese brocade - we have not quite decided what to use it for - it is woven in a very small pattern with different colors & gold, but the general effect is rather like red shot silk. We bought a lovely picture for the smoke room - \$40 - it was rather extravagant but we both were anxious to have it, & it makes a great difference to the room. We could not get anything

but a large picture on that  
wall paper. It is an  
engraving - the same size  
as the original - of the  
Laughing Cavalier of  
Franz Hals. I love that  
picture & so does Leif so  
when we saw it in Hall &  
Holtz we could'nt resist it.  
It was marked \$50 but Leif  
insisted on having the price  
reduced. finally they asked  
\$42<sup>50</sup>. Leif said all right  
but they must take off  
2<sup>50</sup> for cash. I got a small

black cat from Mrs  
Valentine of the Bridge  
Club. Leif is delighted with  
it & says it is very clever,  
in fact the boy said to me  
today that it was "very  
clever," so it is having a  
good time. The next business  
is to lay & give away Bibbi's  
rugs, but they are such  
shameful mongrels that  
I shouldn't think anyone  
would agree to take them.  
I think she is just starting  
to get tired of them

herself. On Saturday  
there is a pony show. Mrs.  
Pocas is going with us -  
I hope the weather will be  
good - at present it is  
very wet. So many people  
have been complaining  
about the rain but I suppose  
I have been so busy in the  
house I haven't noticed it.  
I still owe two calls which  
I mean to get over the first  
fine day. one to Mrs.  
Tollefson & another to Mrs  
Bastler - she is so nice. her

husband is a partner in  
Arnhold & Warburg's.  
I have still five letters to  
write so I must get to  
them.
