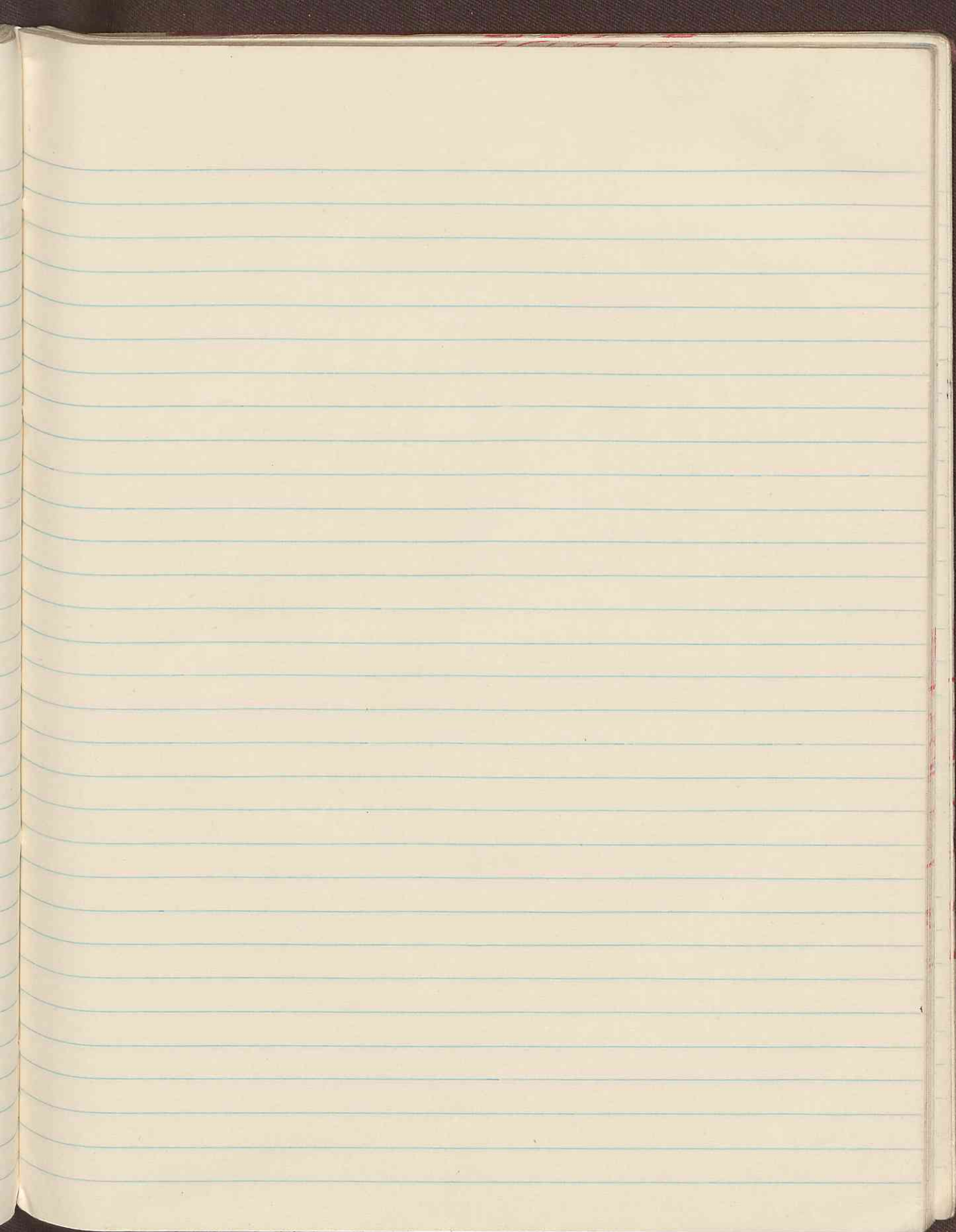

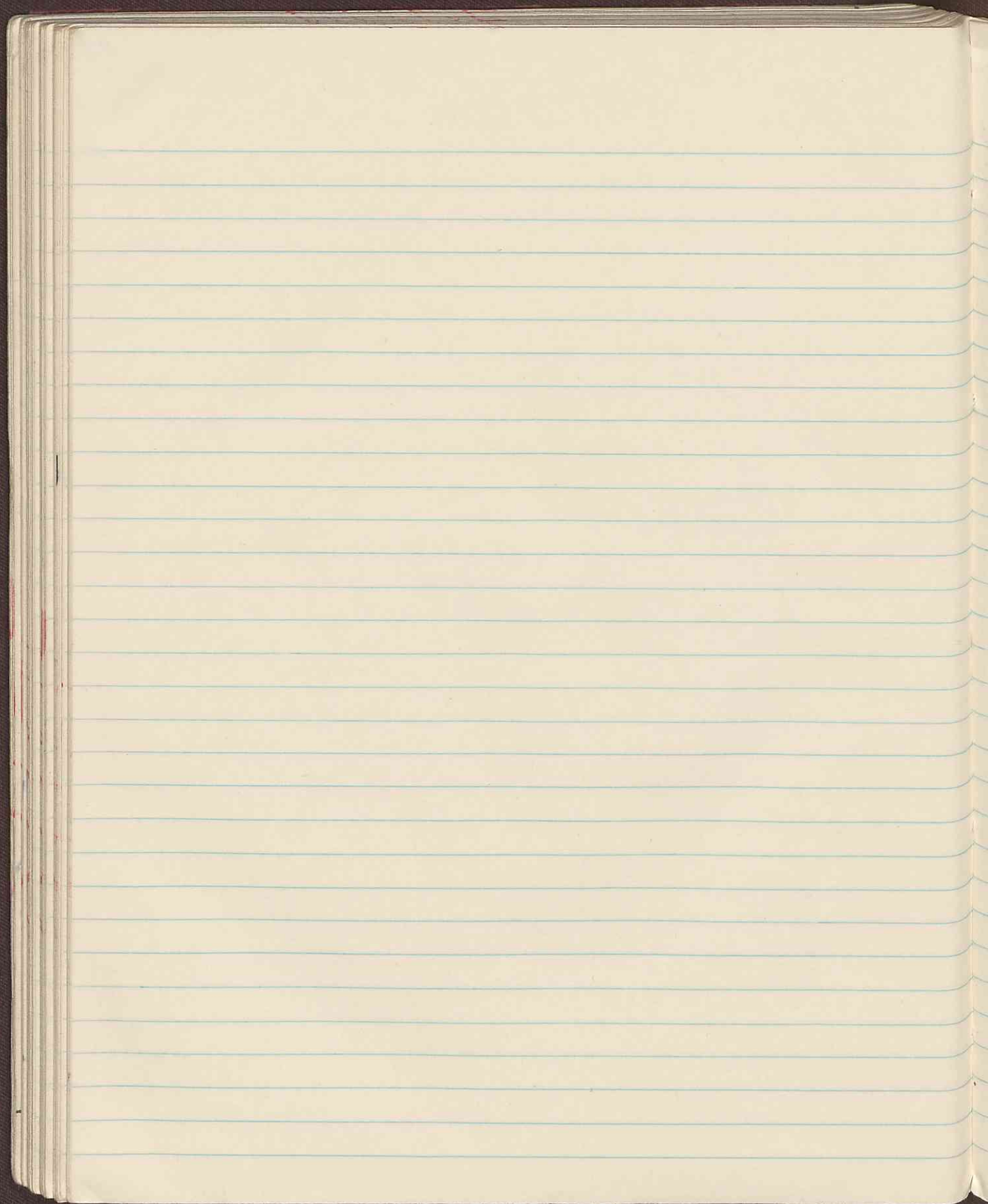

First of all because Paul Ableman's play ought to be known, for it ~~enacts~~ ~~gives us an uniquely insight into our generation~~ which we ought and especially known by us, as more or less distinguished ~~st~~ the privileged and poverty stricken dweller in academia the sumptuous university, ~~whose~~ ~~cheapest unimpaired with not only to the~~ ~~squandered digress~~ ~~valley fed and badly~~ ~~accommodated and too often badly taught,~~ it is not easilyactable although it is difficult to approve of a play put on by a university group in which there are only two actors, ~~but~~ if both characters are research students living in the kind of loveless ^{student dwelling} propinquity and expensive squalor that any ~~dweller~~ ^{dweller} in a university town must know, ~~it~~ ~~she~~ it is probably right that university actors should act it.

Bob ^{Stephen Brumby} lacy and Jake ^{Marshall Taitner} Peren have lived cheek by jowl for five years. Bob is a geneticist scientist endeavoring to breed a kind of maize that will live on $\frac{1}{2}$ of the usual water usually necessary for its growth. Jake is a ^{mutualist} ~~communist~~. Bob is from a poor family (Stephen Brumby's ghost of a Northern twang seemed appropriate) and Jake from a fairly privileged background. It is the summer, Easter

You, and their long cohabitation is at an end. They have managed to live together by means of a game that they play, in which Lacey becomes Bradshaw, and Percival Carnutters; and one adopts a character and implies a situation and the other knows suit: it may be that of a ^{business deal} ~~business deal~~ and an ^{incompetent} ~~incompetent~~ ^{wishy-washy} ~~executive~~, too Irish ~~melancholy~~; a plantation owner and a black slave. The dimension of pretending is resorted to whenever the relations between the two seem to be ~~about~~ strained, or even merely overly expressed: complicity in the game reestablished ~~in~~ intimacy on a harmless level, so that they can continue to sleep on the duan beds in the same littered room.

Nevertheless it cannot be called an equilibrium. Jake is assertive, arrogant, noisy and Bob has learnt how to give way almost imperceptibly, turning off his record player when he enters the room, tolerating the spilling of his belongings about. In the first act we sympathise with this funny underdog ~~for~~ as is our British wont, and we tend to agree with his condemnation of the absent gun drinking, erratic ~~and~~ ~~too~~ Julia, whom Jake wants to palm off on him, because as Bob says he cannot meet his own responsibilities to her. Moreover he has a lovely girl called Gloria for whom he is keeping himself pure.

When he turns on Jake at the end of the first act we applaud the worm turning: we agree that Jake takes the dominant parts in their imaginary situations. We can see that he is fascinated by himself, and his relationship with Julia does indeed seem to be sordid.

In the second act we pass from this attitude to another subtler and more significant one. The meek, unassuming, sensitive Bob, who would not manipulate others or force himself upon anyone's notice, turns out to be complacent, impotent, passionless, as arrogant as Jake (but ~~more~~ ^{less perceptibly} so). Glona is a fiction, a ~~real~~ ^{but} ~~he~~ ^{shared pretence} like their games. He manipulates Jake by luring him with a particularly juicy dominant role after a particularly painful interchange. Finally it is Jake, who had always included Bob in his thoughtless generosity, who strips away his meekness and exposes a greater egotism and the ruthlessness of the ^{unscrupulously} committed scientist for whom people have no meaning, whose tireless unremitting labour is ~~nothing~~ ^{masking a flight} but an escape from the world. The ~~po~~ catalyst to this process of denuding after five years of successful menage in which the personality never let itself be seen naked, is Julia, insecure, sordid, desirous, impetuous, from whom Bob recoils in fear and revulsion and whom Jake has got to know, and exploit, and love a little.
