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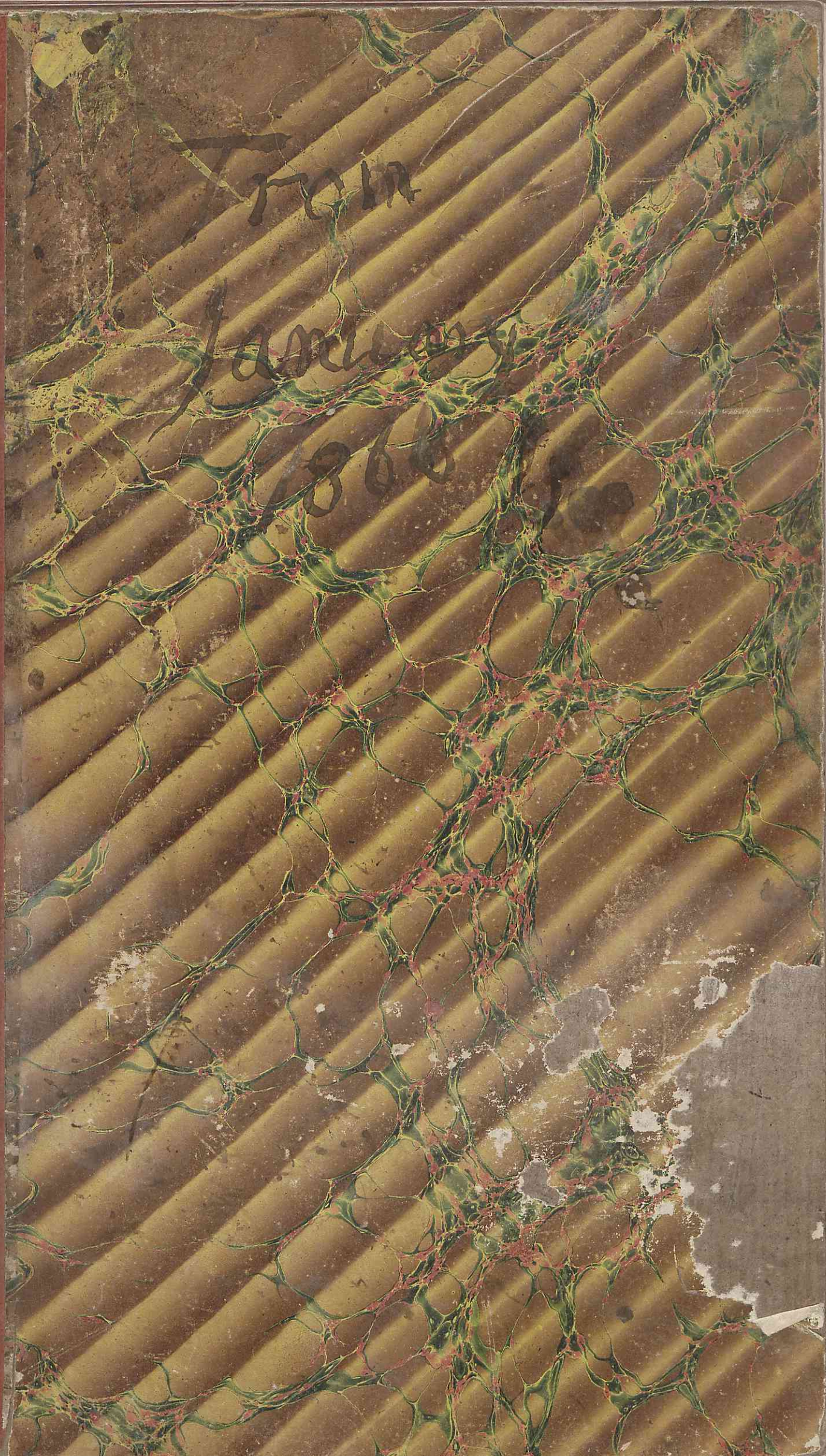

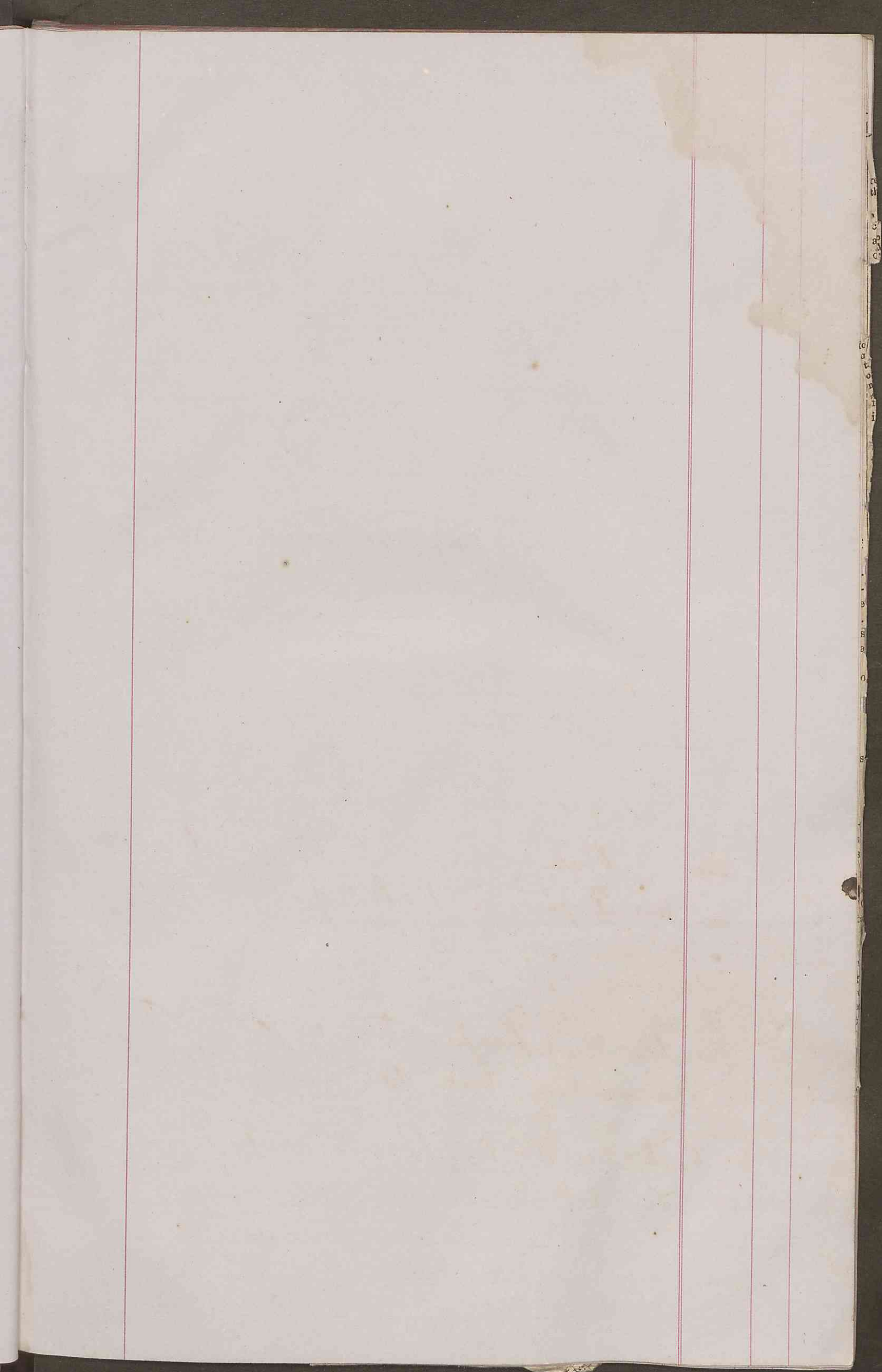

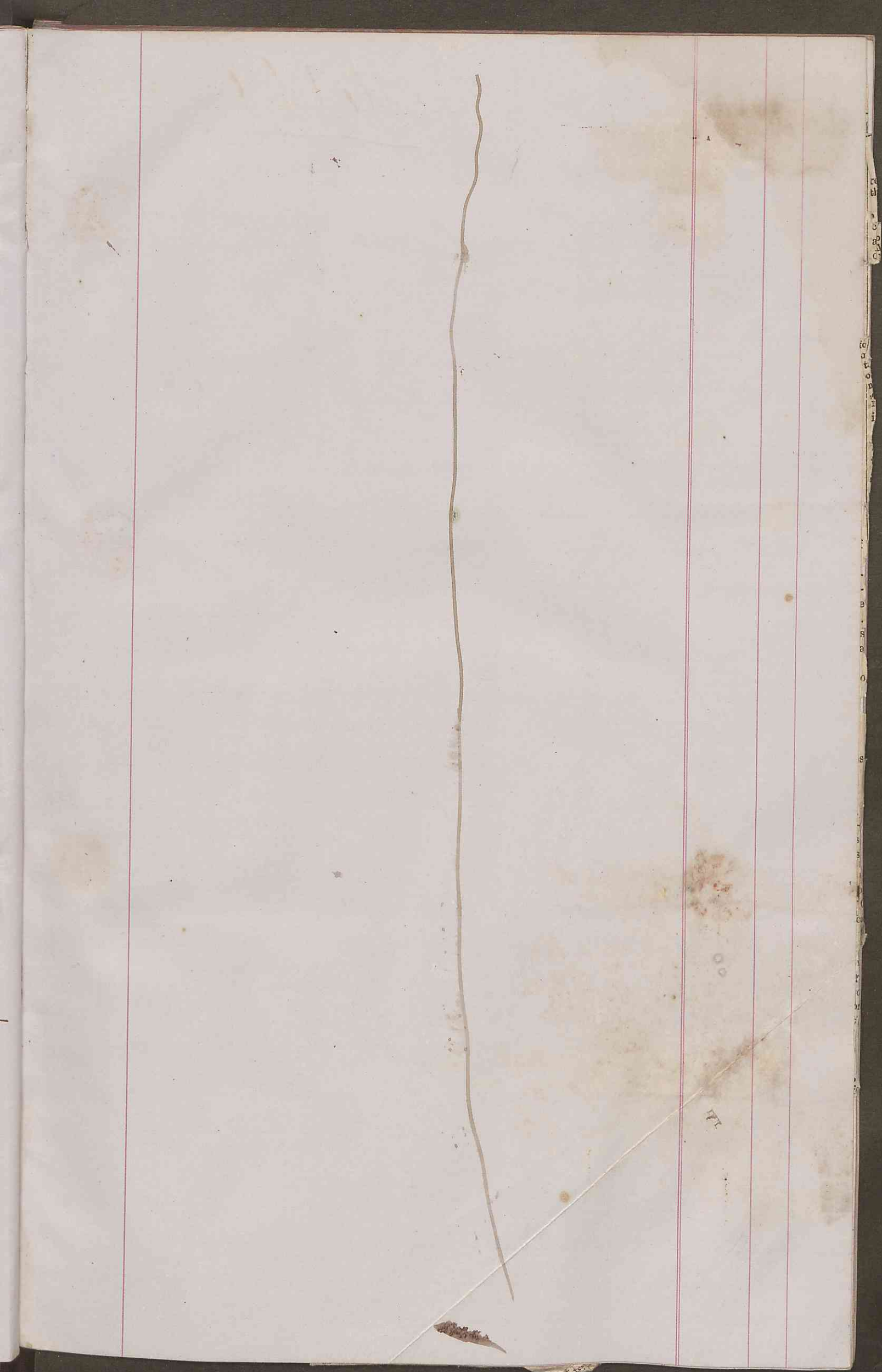

CONSOLIDATED BANK.

The half-yearly meeting of the proprietors of this bank was held yesterday afternoon at the London Tavern, Mr. T. A. HANKEY in the chair.

Mr. BOORE, the manager, having read the notice convening the meeting, read the report as follows:—

"The directors submit the statement of accounts and balance sheet of the bank for the half-year ending 31st December, 1865:—The net profits of the bank during the half-year (after deducting current expenses, rebate of interest on bills not due, interest accrued to customers, income-tax, and directors' remuneration, and making ample provision for bad and doubtful debts) amount to 61,138l. 13s. 9d.; the balance left unappropriated on the 30th of June was 6,812l. 14s.; making a total of 67,951l. 7s. 9d., from which it is proposed to declare a dividend for the half-year at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, and a bonus of 3s. per share (being an additional 7½ per cent. per annum), free of income-tax, 52,500l.; to carry to reserved surplus fund, 10,000l.; to carry forward to next account, 5,451l. 7s. 9d.; total, 67,951l. 7s. 9d. The reserved surplus fund, which stood on the 30th June at 70,065l. 16s., will, by the addition of six months' interest, 1,743l. 3s. 10d., and the appropriation now recommended, 10,000l., be increased to 81,808l. 19s. 10d. John Pemberton Heywood, Coleridge John Kennard, Adam Steinmetz Kennard, and James Wyllie, Esqrs., are the directors who retire by rotation; being eligible, they offer themselves for re-election. According to the provisions of the deed of settlement, the auditors offer themselves for re-election by the shareholders at this meeting."

The CHAIRMAN, in moving the adoption of the report, observed that the net profits of the bank during the past half-year had been satisfactory. (Cheers.) Before moving the adoption of the report, he begged to impress upon them the importance of their uniting their influence for the purpose of bringing new current and deposit accounts to the bank. They were a most influential proprietary, and if they only exerted themselves moderately in this direction, he had no doubt that so large a sum would be added every half-year to the permanent deposits of the bank that in the course of a very short time the institution would equal in magnitude and success the largest and most successful of the London joint stock banks. (Hear, hear.) He concluded by moving the adoption of the report.

Mr. FAREBROTHER seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

In reply to a question from a SHAREHOLDER,

The CHAIRMAN stated that there was no present intention of removing the bank premises, and they certainly would not do so unless they received advantages which would fully compensate them for doing so. There was no foundation for the report that they were about to occupy the premises now occupied by the London and County Bank.

The report was then put and carried unanimously.

The retiring directors, Messrs. J. P. Heywood, C. J. Kennard, A. S. Kennard, and J. Wyllie, were re-elected, as were the retiring auditors, and

A cordial vote of thanks to the chairman and directors for their able management of the affairs of the bank terminated the proceedings.

It was announced that a branch is intended to be opened at Pancrasy-lane. The liabilities of the bank on current accounts and "acceptances"—the latter not being stated separately—are 18,215,358l.

The report of the Consolidated Bank (formerly the Bank of Manchester, Heywood, Kennards, and Hankeys), to be presented on the 25th inst., states the available total, including a previous balance of 6,812l., to be 67,951l., and recommends a dividend at the rate of 10 per cent. per annum, and a bonus of 3s. per share (being an additional 7½ per cent. per annum), which will absorb 52,500l. The sum of 10,000l. is to be added to reserve, which will thus be raised to 81,808l., and 5,451l. will remain to be carried forward. The liabilities of the bank on current accounts are 3,037,435l., and on acceptances 780,563l.

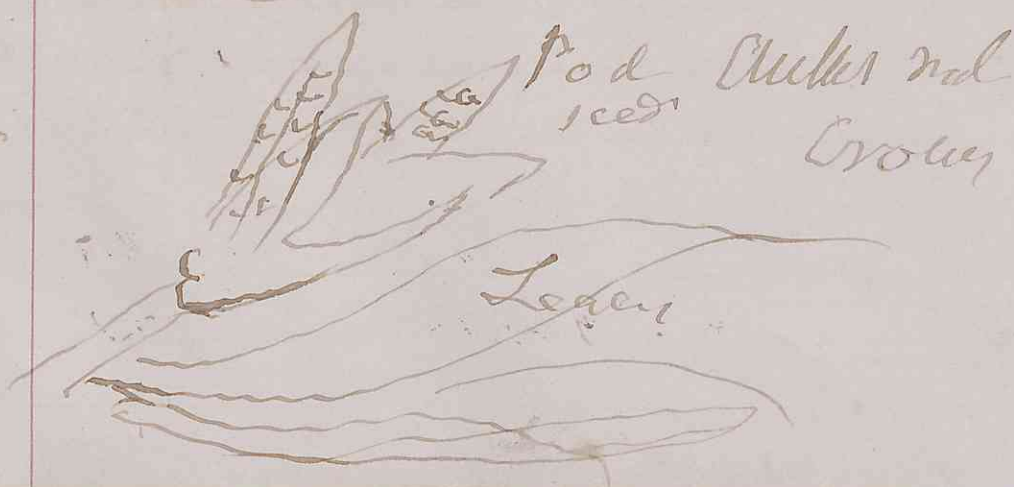
