This favors to acquaint that I got safe to London ye 1.<sup>st</sup> day of this Month and find myself obliged to desire you to send me a Bill for ye ten pound for I am fust to bye many things which I did not think of besides y<sup>e</sup> money already due for y<sup>e</sup> salaries - please to tell your maid Mary Cox that I sent her letter to her sister for I could not go with it my self by reason it was 14 miles from this, and had no body to go with me. I have been to shaw y<sup>e</sup> Brothers things, and find gold go at the same rate as in y<sup>e</sup> Bristol I have wrote to him about it - I conclude with my hearty love to yourself and sister and Jos<sup>ph</sup>. Sarah, my love to sister Ann y<sup>e</sup> Brother & sister James, and Brother Jeremy with hearty thanks for all yours and their kindnesses. Just your loving sister
