March 8. 1747

The tenderness and regard which you have

call himself your Nephew will not be disagreeable or
displeasing.

"I am afraid I have taken up too much of your
time already, therefore I only beg leave to say, that it
was with great pleasure I heard of the marriage of
my Cousin, and with greater still of the comfortable
prospect of its being an happy one. It is too the most
comfortable satisfaction to me that I hear of the
felicity of my other Relations, most of which felicity
I beg leave to say, is owing under God to your kindness
and goodness."
