HISTORICAL NOTE	William G. Hay was born in 1875 into a successful Adelaide family with literary connections. He was educated at Melbourne Grammar and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he decided to become a writer. In 1901 he published his first novel, 'Stifled laughter', returned to Australia, married Mary Williams and settled near Adelaide. Being of 'independent means' he was able to devote himself to full-time writing and he published six novels as well as short stories. The novels were all set in the decade of the 1830's and deal with colonial themes which he painstakingly researched. He died in South Australia in 1945.

Born in South Australia, 17th Nov., 1875.

Educated at Melbourne Grammar School and Trinity College, Cambridge. Graduated B.A., having read law. Did not continue with this, and became full time novelist. His first novel, Stifled laughter, was published in 1901.

Married Mary V. Williams in 1901, and settled at Beaumont near Adelaide. In 1924, he moved to 'Nangawooka,' near Victor Harbour. He died on 2nd March, 1945.

His other novels were Herridge of Reality Swamp (1907), Captain Quadring (1912), The Escape of the notorious Sir William Heans (1919), An Australian Rip Van Winkle (1921), Strabane of the Mulberry Hills (1929), The Myster, of Alfred Doubt (1937).
